9.00am: Welcome - Chris Venables - head of politics, Green Alliance

Welcome to the day from Green Alliance's head of politics, **Chris Venables**; introduction to the context and importance of 2021 as a year of action on climate and nature.

He will introduce short video messages from **Rt Hon Sir Keir Starmer MP**, leader of the Labour Party, **Rt Hon Lord Zac Goldsmith**, minister for pacific and the environment at FCDO and Defra, and **Roseanna Cunningham MSP**, cabinet secretary for the environment in the Scottish Government.



Chris Venables is the head of politics at Green Alliance. In his role, Chris works to build the political momentum for bold and ambitious political action on the climate and nature crises.



Sir Keir Starmer has served as the MP for Holborn and St Pancras since 2015. He is currently the leader of the Labour Party. Before becoming an MP, Sir Keir held the roles of director of public prosecutions as well as head of the Crown Prosecution Service.



Rt Hon Lord Zac Goldsmith is the minister for pacific and the environment at FCDO and Defra. His responsibilities include; ocean and Blue Belt, international environment, climate, biodiversity, forestry and biodiversity and illegal wildlife trade.



Roseanna Cunningham MSP was appointed Cabinet Secretary for Environment, Climate Change and Land Reform in May 2016. She has remained a member of the Scottish Parliament from 1999 to present and has been a Committee Convener for the Justice Committee, the Health Committee and the Rural Affairs and Environment Committee.

9.15am - What has 2020 meant for climate and nature action?

2020 has been an extraordinary year. The devastation of Covid-19 has starkly highlighted our relationship with nature. As well as the pandemic, wildfires and floods in many countries, and the unprecedented loss of glacial ice, mean that the impacts of climate change are now being felt right across the globe. The UN General Assembly, the Leaders' Summit on Biodiversity and the US election all put climate and nature centre stage, but the UN summits on biodiversity (COP15) and climate (COP26) were postponed to 2021.

What can we expect from the landmark events taking place in 2021? Join us for this opening panel discussion where we will hear reflections on the events of 2020 and what it all means for the future.

Chaitanya Kumar is head of environment at the New Economics Foundation (NEF). Chaitanya leads NEF's environmental programmes, including their work on a Green New Deal and a just transition.
